Old shop lots, Selangor

An increasingly rare sight nowadays, bamboo blinds (or 'check blinds') were a common feature of shophouses, especially those from the pre-war era in Southeast Asian countries such as Malaysia and Singapore. These blinds were made of long strips of bamboo tied together with strings, and could be rolled up or down via a simple rope-pulley system.

As a shading device, they are extremely effective not only in cooling the shops themselves, but also the area along the foot-way. Beyond this practical function, however, what makes these old-school blinds stand out is their story – a symbol of simpler times, they double up as advertising 'medium' for each unique shop, conveying a story with splashes of colours or illustrative messages – reminiscent of the time when movie posters were still hand-painted.

Debt and desperation driving overseas kidney sales

An increasing number of Myanmar people are selling kidneys as a quick-fix solution to poverty and debt, with many donors going to India for transplants and telling lies to have them approved.

Ma Nyein Nyein Naing, 27, wants to sell one of her kidneys to pay off a big debt even though she is four months pregnant and knows that having the organ removed might affect the health of the foetus.

She lives in Yangon's West Hlaing Tharyar Township and works at a garment factory but her salary is inadequate to cover her debt, which has accrued since her husband left four months ago, and pay for the cost of giving birth.

"My salary is K140,000 (US\$50) a month, but my debt is K2 million (\$700). To give birth and raise this child I need more money and I don't want to be in debt. That's why I want to sell my kidney - I will find a way to do it safely", said Nyein Nyein Naing, who divorced while pregnant with this, her first child.

It was not an easy decision to sell a kidney, but she has no other way of raising a large amount of money in a short time. She has taken the first step by joining a Facebook group of people affected by kidney disease to make contact with prospective transplant recipients.

However, she is yet to receive an offer from brokers, agents or anyone needing a transplant. Nyein Nyein Naing said that because she is pregnant, she has been advised not to sell a kidney.

"If a pregnant woman donates or sells a kidney, she and the foetus will definitely be in danger," a doctor

Alibaba enlists academics in lobbying effort to restore reputation

Push comes as group tries to recover from regulatory assault that wiped billions off its market value

Alibaba has been paying academics to lobby Chinese authorities to relax regulations and rehabilitate its reputation as the e-commerce group attempts to navigate Beijing's tech crackdown.

Chinese scholars involved in Alibaba's lobbying operation published essays and submitted reports in support of the company to authorities in Beijing, including the State Administration for Market Regulation, which hit the group with a record fine for antitrust abuses in 2021.

Alibaba provided the scholars with money, data, information and interview opportunities to bolster their research, according to more than 10 academics, government officials and company employees who spoke to the Financial Times. The company also promised to fund some scholars' research projects.


"Alibaba's lobbying muscle is top-notch among the internet giants," said a Beijing-based scholar, speaking on condition of anonymity. "When [they] came to my door ... I could hardly say no."

The group's academic push comes as the company tries to recover from a regulatory assault that has wiped billions from its market value, with its share price down more than 60 per cent since its peak in October 2020.


Stock indexed based on closing price on November 25, 2023


